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Learning Programme 2017

Who we are

The Peace Museum is located in central Bradford and is the only one of its kind in the UK. It uses its collection of 7000 artefacts to tell the stories of peace, peacemakers and the peace movement in the UK. It does this through exhibitions and educational outreach. Its curriculum materials are recognised as a model of Best Practice by the PREVENT team at the Home Office in **countering radicalisation and promoting community cohesion**. These resources are cross curricular which conform to the National Curriculum, from Primary through to Post-16.



What we offer

Visits and Workshops:

Museum Discovery Session *Suitable for Key Stages Two, Three and Four*

This session was new for 2016 and involves pupils **discovering the history of peace**. Objects are selected from the collection and the pupils are tasked with discovering what the object is and what it can tell us about the history of peace through discussion, careful thought and using other objects on display as a clue. It culminates in the pupils devising a group presentation to present what they have discovered. This is a cross-curricular session which introduces the general themes of peace and relates to specific historical events. It **can be adapted** to cover certain historical periods or themes according to level of study. A session usually lasts two hours.

Bradford Routes to Peace Heritage Trail Visit *Suitable for all school ages*

Groups begin their day at the Museum and spend around one hour on a guided tour of our exhibitions with a member of staff. Teachers then begin the trail which involves visiting places of interest within Bradford city centre and the surrounding area. The trail is approximately 2.5 miles long, which takes around 90 minutes to complete. It is accompanied by a printed guide and an app. The trail not only takes you to places of interest but tells the story of Bradford's history and its longstanding affinity with peace, including sites such as the J.B Priestley statue and Bradford Pals Battalion memorial. The day is **cross-curricular encompassing local and national history** whilst incorporating the message of peace. Teachers complete half of the trail in the morning, take lunch at the Peace Museum and complete the trail in the afternoon.

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Poppies, Remembrance and War Horses Workshop Visit *Suitable for Key Stages One and Two*

The workshop explores the theme of remembrance, the significance of the **red, white and purple poppies** and explores the familiar story of Michael Morpurgo's War Horse and the real life story of Bradford's very own warhorse 'Spare Parts'. It also covers the history of the First World War. It involves a discussion surrounding what remembrance is, ways to remember, and why we remember, followed by a poppy making session. It highlights themes such as choice and friendship and encourages children to discuss and express what is important to them, through a symbol designing activity. A session usually lasts two hours. The session is available all year. Book early for November 2017.



The Right to Peace: Children's Rights and Peace

Suitable for Key Stage Two

This workshop covers children's rights, human rights and the **link between the idea of universal human rights and a peaceful world**. It includes local history taken from our 'The Peace Challenge' Resource, discussing the actions of social reformers such as William Forster and Margaret Macmillan in improving the lives of children and improving access to education for all. A session usually lasts around 2 hours.

Curriculum Resources:

Our curriculum resources can be purchased for teachers to develop their own scheme at school or can be the basis of a workshop here at the Peace Museum.

Choices Then and Now Resource £5.00 + p&p

'Choices Then and Now' takes an alternative approach to the teaching of the First World War. It considers the choices and consequences available to individuals (particularly the young) then and now. It focuses on information, evidence, propaganda and digital literacy, it challenges extremism and builds resilience and is based around 15 untold stories and real items from the Peace Museum's collection. It is supported by a teacher's guide, with plans, background information and a selection of stories. It also includes a CD ROM with templates, activity resources and copies of primary and secondary sources. The resource has now formed the basis of a Choices Exhibition, held at Bradford Playhouse. The project is an innovative and creative approach to the delivery of the **Prevent duty, SMSC, Citizenship, Extremism and Resilience** and has been identified as a model of Best Practice by the Prevent team at the Home Office and the Department for Education and is now being rolled out across the UK. Sport, Courage, Peace and Friendship Resource £5.00 + p&p

Sport and the Olympic and Paralympic values: **stories, visual literacy** and a range of **activities** closely linked to the topical theme of sport and London 2012. It is suitable for all key stages and includes the stories of Jesse Owens and Luz Long (A Leap for Friendship), the Christmas truce 1914 (Football for Christmas), Walter Tull, Tani Grey Thomson, identity and nationality and much more. It has a supporting 80 page resource CD ROM and teachers' booklet.



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The Peace Challenge Resource £5.00 +

p&p

This resource is commissioned and sponsored by the Soroptimists International (Bingley) and explores peace-making and peacemakers then and now. The focus is on individuals with a local connection, whose actions have had an impact for good locally, nationally and globally. A booklet that has stories and ideas for teaching and learning accompanies this resource. It has a **peer education element and encourages historical enquiry** alongside active citizenship. Children and young people can learn about the Peace Tree, William Forster, Richard Oastler, Margaret McMillan, Miriam Lord, Dietrich Bonhoeffer and Kenneth and David Hockney. They consider the statement and question 'This is what they did then. What can I do now?' It has been designed particularly for Key Stage Two, but it is also possible to adapt this for older children.



Pricing

The group size for each session is maximum 30 children.

Routes to Peace Heritage Trail Visit: £50.00 for the day.

Workshops are priced at **£50 per half day** session and **£100 per full day** session.
